

Sexual abuse by a priest, deacon or a staff member or volunteer of the Church should be reported to the Office of Safe Environment for the Diocese of Wheeling-Charleston. The Eucharist: Source & Summit History, Old Testament Types: Abraham & the Sacrifice of Isaac (Pars Tertia, 28 January 2024)

BEFORE passing on to the sacrifice as a holocaust and the direct connection with the Crucifixion in the passage, I want to circle back here, in relation to the poignant demand that God makes of Abraham, to consider the way in which this event is a testing of Abraham, and specifically a testing of his obedience as to the will of God. I do so, gentle reader, because having considered Isaac as a type of Christ, there is an argument to be made for Abraham also being a type of Christ at the same time as Isaac is and in the same narrative, but in a very different manner.

Unlike the Abraham's passive role in the offering of Melchizedek, which we have already considered – a role in which Abraham stands in for us, in a certain way – here Abraham is the actor, the one called upon to make the sacrifice and to immolate his son, Isaac. He is both the one presenting a treasured thing for sacrifice and the one who is actually carrying out the sacrifice. In the former role, Abraham is a type of God the Father, who presents His only-begotten Son for sacrifice on our behalf and for the salvation of the whole world. In the latter role, especially as he makes both the remote and proximate preparations for the sacrifice, and as he raises his



knife to cut his son's throat before setting the fire to immolate the offering, Abraham shows himself to be the priest.

It is important for us to see both Isaac and Abraham as types of Christ, dear friends, as this helps us to better see Christ as both the victim to be offered and the priest, as the lamb of sacrifice and as the one offering the blood of the lamb in holocaust to the Father, beseeching the killing angel to pass us by. The Letter to the Hebrews provides a deep theology of Christ as priest – this, indeed, can be argued to be the central point of the letter – and points to His offering of His own body and blood upon the cross as the victim:

But when Christ came as high priest of the good things that have come to be, passing through the greater and more perfect tabernacle not made by hands, that is, not belonging to this creation, he entered once for all into the sanctuary, not with the blood of goats and calves but with his own blood, thus obtaining eternal redemption. For if the blood of goats and bulls and the sprinkling of a heifer's ashes can sanctify those who are defiled so that their flesh is cleansed, how much more will the blood of Christ, who through the eternal spirit offered himself unblemished to God, cleanse our consciences from dead works to worship the living God (Heb 9:11-14).

And lest we miss the point of this, the intervening angel who stays Abraham's hand points to a ram caught in the thicket so that he may offer the blood of an animal rather than the blood of his son. St. Paul draws our attention to the fact that Christ enters the sanctuary with his own blood, not with the blood of goats or calves (9:12), making indelible the image of Christ as Priest and Victim.

St. Thomas Aquinas, when he takes up the question of Christ's priesthood (ST III, 22), bases his own arguments on the theology of Hebrews 7-9, demonstrating that Christ is both the Victim and the Priest (c.f. ST III, 22, 2). Even the Church's law of prayer points to the mystery that Isaac and Abraham demonstrate for us of Christ as Victim and Priest. The Preface for Easter V teaches:

By the oblation of his Body,

he brought the sacrifices of old to fulfillment

in the reality of the Cross,

and, by commending himself to you for our salvation,

showed himself the Priest, the Altar, and the Lamb of sacrifice.

And so, we are not seeing things not present or drawing conclusions unsupported by the teaching and prayer of the Church. Christ is both the Victim and the Priest of the New Covenant, while these roles were decisively split in the Old Covenant, as the Patriarchs Abraham and Isaac show us.

There is a further reality in that both priests, Abraham and Christ, are motivated by obedience to the Father's request. For neither is the request easy; if it were, their obedience to it would be of little value. For both the request runs contrary to human nature – that a father should sacrifice his son or that a person should intentionally destroy himself strikes us, rightly so, as inhuman. That the act is requested by the authority of God transforms the act from unnatural and vicious to sanctified, while being nonetheless horrible. Indeed, the Sacrifice of Isaac does present us with a test of Abraham: whether he will be obedient to God even *in extremis* and when the request itself would seem to undermine the promise. That God stays Abraham's hand in the last moment only serves to underline that God the Father does not, in response to the Son's prayer in Gethsemane, allow the cup to pass Him by. Rather, *Son though he was, [Christ] learned obedience from what he suffered; and when he was made perfect, he became the source of eternal salvation for all who obey him, declared by God high priest according to the order of Melchizedek* (Heb 5:8-10)

In his chastisement of Saul, the prophet Samuel asks

Does the LORD so delight in burnt offerings and sacrifices

as in obedience to the command of the LORD?

Obedience is better than sacrifice,

and submission than the fat of rams (1Sam 15:22)

Little wonder it is, in light of Samuel's words that Saul's successor, the one he tried to slaughter many times in order to hold onto the throne that God had already taken from him, would sing

Sacrifice and offering you do not want;

you opened my ears.

Holocaust and sin-offering you do not request;

so I said, "See; I come

with an inscribed scroll written upon me.

I delight to do your will, my God;

your law is in my inner being! (40:7-9)

It is Saint Paul, once again, who directly links this Psalm of David, and through it obedience to God's will, to the sacrifice of Christ Jesus and our salvation, teaching us

[I]t is impossible that the blood of bulls and goats take away sins. For this reason, when he came into the world, he said:

"Sacrifice and offering you did not desire,

but a body you prepared for me;

holocausts and sin offerings you took no delight in.

Then I said, 'As is written of me in the scroll,

Behold, I come to do your will, O God."

First he says, "Sacrifices and offerings, holocausts and sin offerings, you neither desired nor delighted in." These are offered according to the law. Then he says, "Behold, I come to do your will." He takes away the first to establish the second. By this "will," we have been consecrated through the offering of the body of Jesus Christ once for all (Heb 10:4-10).

Paul sums up his reflection here by saying by one offering he has made perfect forever those who are being consecrated (Heb 10:14). For our purpose here, Abraham's obedience to the Father's request secures for him the promises God has already made. Unlike our first parents who could not keep a very simple request and thus proved themselves unworthy of Eden, Abraham demonstrates that he is obedient even in very difficult things and thus shows himself worthy of the Promised Land and the promised generations and nation. Christ shows Himself completely obedient.

[T]hough he was in the form of God, did not regard equality with God something to be grasped. Rather, he emptied himself, taking the form of a slave, coming in human likeness; and found human in appearance, he humbled himself, becoming obedient to death, even death on a cross (Phil 2:6-9)

And His obedience won new life, grace in place of grace, and the Kingdom of Heaven for all fallen humanity. Thus Abraham, as the obedient priest in this narrative, points us to Christ the great High Priest and Sacrificial Victim, who submitted and did not open his mouth; like a lamb led to slaughter or a sheep silent before shearers, he did not open his mouth (Is 53:7).


